FIRST-TIME, FULL-TIME FRESHMEN FALL TO SPRING RETENTION RATE

The fall-to-spring retention rate for first-time, full-time freshman students will be equal to or greater than the fall to spring retention rate of the previous freshman cohort's fall to spring retention rate. The minimum threshold (64.4%) is equal to the KCU 5-year average rate minus SD*1. The aspirational goal (78.3%) is the average rate plus SD*1 (SD=6.95). (Freshman Cohort Indicator)

Outcome

The fall-to-spring retention rate for the fall 2022 freshman cohort was 80.6% as compared to 69.4% for the fall 2021 cohort. The minimum threshold of 64.4% and the aspirational goal of 78.3% were both met. Multiple subgroups were disaggregated for further analysis. The male F22 cohort was 74.5% which was above the minimum threshold. The female F22 cohort was 93.5% which was above the aspirational goal. The various ethnicity groups had five subgroups above the aspirational goal: US Nonresident, Hispanic, Pacific Islander, and Unknown. The Two or More Races subgroup met the minimum threshold, while the Black/African American subgroup fell below the threshold.

PERFORMANCE INDICATOR 2

FIRST-TIME, FULL-TIME FRESHMEN FALL TO FALL RETENTION RATE

The fall-to-fall retention rate for first-time, full-time freshman students will be equal to or greater than the previous freshman cohort's fall to fall retention rate. The minimum threshold (43.6%) is equal to the KCU 5-year average rate minus SD*1. The aspirational goal (71.5%) is the AIKCU 5-year average rate plus SD*1. (Freshman Cohort Indicator)

Outcome

The fall-to-fall retention rate for the fall 2022 freshman cohort was 46% as compared to 45% for the fall 2021 cohort, increasing by 1%. The minimum threshold of 43.6% was met, however the aspirational goal was not met. The fall 2022 retention rate data for peer institutions was not available at the time of publication.

PERFORMANCE INDICATOR 3 TRANSFER FALL TO FALL RETENTION RATE

The fall-to-fall retention rate for transfer students will be equal to or greater than the previous transfer cohort's fall to fall retention rate. The minimum threshold (46.8%) is equal to the KCU 5-year average rate minus SD*1. The aspirational goal (71.1%) is the KCU 5-year average rate plus SD*1. (Transfer Cohort Indicator)

Outcome

The fall-to-fall retention rate for the fall 2021 freshman cohort was 65.1% as compared to 51.4% for the fall 2020 cohort, increasing by 13.7%. The minimum threshold of 46.8% was met, however the aspirational goal was not met.



PERFORMANCE INDICATOR 1 FIRST-TIME FRESHMEN GRADUATION RATES

The percentage of students who enter as first-time first-year freshmen and complete their degree within 150% of the typical time to complete a baccalaureate degree (6 years) will be equal to or greater than the previous cohort's completion rate. The aspirational goal (36%) is equal to the four-year average rate plus the STD*1 and the minimum threshold (30%) is the average two-year mean score minus the STD*1. (Freshman Cohort Indicator)







The 2015 cohort graduation rate was 36% overall, with men graduating at 24% within 150% time and women graduating at 55% within 150% time. The 2016 cohort decreased the 150% graduation rate by 5% as compared to the 2015 cohort. The male graduation rate decreased by 2% and the female graduation rate decreased by 11%. The minimum threshold for the 2016 cohort was met but the aspirational goal was not.

Seeking Continuous Improvement

While the minimum threshold was met by 2016 cohort, this was a decrease from the 2015 cohort. KCU also recognizes the graduation lag behind peer institutions and with male students. Improvements have been made over the last 5 years to ensure that students are provided with strong academic support. The University's QEP focuses on improving student success through mentoring. Further improvements are being made in the 2023-2024 academic year, specifically with the addition of success coaches.

Identification of At-Risk Students

Beginning in 2013, KCU began to informally address the need to improve reading skills to increase academic success. In 2020, KCU formally established its QEP with the purpose to improve student success by focusing on reading skills of first-year and new transfer students through a program emphasizing student mentoring. During Spring 2023, KCU assigned all current students a success coach to assist in the registration process and to serve as a starting point when students have questions but don't know which department/employee to talk to about it. Beginning in the 2023-2024 academic year, all new students will be assigned a success coach at the beginning of their academic career.

PERFORMANCE INDICATOR 2 TRANSFER GRADUATION RATES

The percentage of students who enter as transfers with 60 or more earned credit hours and complete their degree within 3 years will be equal to or greater than the previous cohort. The aspirational goal is equal to the three-year average rate plus STD*1 (74.84%) and the minimum threshold is the three-year average rate minus STD*1 (49.83%). (Transfer Cohort Indicator)

Outcome

The 2020 transfer cohort with students who entered in with 60 or more credit hours had a completion rate of 50% within 3 years, as compared to 75% completion rate with the 2019 transfer cohort. The minimum threshold was met, however the expected goal and aspirational goal were not met.

PERFORMANCE INDICATOR 3 GRADUATE STUDENT GRADUATION RATES

The percentage of graduate students who complete their degree within 2.5 years will be equal to or greater than the previous cohort. The aspirational goal is equal to the five-year average rate plus STD*1 (64.9%) and the minimum threshold is the five-year average rate minus STD*1 (56.8%). (Graduate Student Cohort Indicator)

The average combines 2.5 years and 3 years for the 2018 cohort, giving a completion rate of 64.4% with 3 years. This adjustment was made to account for the impact of COVID-19 on students' ability to complete the program on regular schedule.

Outcome

The 2020 graduate student cohort had a completion rate of 55.3% within 3 years, as compared to 60% completion rate with the 2019 transfer cohort. The minimum threshold was not met. 10 students had withdrawn. Of those 10, two were MSN students and eight were in the Keeran School of Bible & Ministry graduate programs. Six withdrew within one semester. Given that the 2020 cohort began and the majority of withdrawals occurred during COVID-19, KCU will continue to monitor the completion rate for future cohorts.



PERFORMANCE INDICATOR 1 NURSING LICENSURE PASS RATES

Based on a five-year average, 89.5% of nursing students will pass the NCLEX test. The aspirational goal is 100%. The minimum threshold is 80%, because this is the minimum passing rate set by CCNE accreditation standards. (Yancey School of Nursing Indicator, licensure only)
