NEW PROGRAMS TO BE OFFERED IN FALL '22

The Schools within Academic Affairs continue to identify ways to support the mission and vision of Kentucky Christian University while providing educational opportunities that equip students to serve in their churches and society. If you know high school students or non-traditional students who are interested in missions, teaching or coaching, our new programs can help prepare them. In addition to the new programs, we continue to serve and train students in areas such as preaching, ministry, nursing, pre-med, history, pre-law, social work, psychology, and business. With faith integrated into all of our classes, we equip students to serve as Christian professionals in the careers to which they have been called.

Teacher Education P.E. & Health

Available as Bachelor Degree or Minor

The Keeran School of Education has worked to develop a Baccalaureate degree with a major in Teacher Education Physical Education and Health. The degree will launch upon final approval from the Education Professional Standards Board of Kentucky. Students graduating with that degree will be able to pursue certification from the Commonwealth of Kentucky to serve as teachers to meet the needs of school districts and positively impact the lives of their students. Our schools, both public and private, along with their students, would benefit



from dedicated, compassionate, teachers whose educational experience focused on Christ, Character and Career. Graduates from the program who serve as coaches will have opportunities to be salt and light within their schools, communities and in the lives of their student athletes.

Intercultural Studies

Available as Certificate, Minor, or Associates Degree

The Keeran School of Bible and Ministry has made a concerted effort to continue to develop programs that are mission driven in order to lay a foundation of biblical knowledge and understanding essential to Christian leadership and service. Part of that effort resulted in the development of a certificate in Intercultural Studies and Missions that will help students begin to develop intercultural competency. The certificate can be used toward an Associate degree or Baccalaureate degree within the Keeran School of Bible and Ministry. Students majoring in other programs can also pursue a new minor in Intercultural Studies and Missions. The Intercultural Studies and Missions program is led by Dr. Dale Meade, who serves as a missionary-in-residence. He has been spreading the gospel in the jungles of Colombia for over 40 years.



Dr. Meade commented: "We here at KCU recognize our own heritage and well deserved reputation in missions and intercultural competency having produced many pioneering missionaries over the years and we now plan to build upon and strengthen that heritage by expanding and further developing our program in missions/intercultural studies. We are excited to share expansion in our missions offerings with you as we launch a well developed program in what has been our primary vision and calling since the founding of this school!"

DR. ROGER HUSTON TO LEAD SCHOOL OF BUSINESS



KCU is pleased to announce the addition of Dr. Roger Huston as the Dean of the School of Business. He brings a variety of experience to that position with almost two decades of leadership experience in business, government, and the nonprofit sector.

Dr. Huston has a B.A. in Religion from Simpson College, M.A.R. from Yale University, M.P.A. from Iowa State University and a Ph.D. in Public Policy from the University of Delaware. He comes to us most recently from serving as the principal consultant and owner of Faith Works Consulting.

Roger's wife, Shawna, is a veterinarian and Area Medical Director and they have two (very active) boys, Noah and Micah.

Voice: What is your vision for the School of Business?

Dr. Huston: *Our vision is to be regarded as a premier Christian program that develops transformative leaders who positively impact their communities. We aim to achieve this by nurturing strong Christian character in our students while simultaneously enabling them to pursue opportunities for career advancement and service to God. Additionally, we endeavor to cultivate lasting relationships with our business and community partners who are instrumental in supporting our work to educate the next generation of leaders. In working together, we believe our shared mission and goals will create permanent cultural and economic value in the Appalachian region and beyond.*

Voice: How do you plan to incorporate faith into the program?

ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

CHRIS MCQUISTION

"Kentucky Christian has prepared me to view everything that I do through a Christian worldview. It has molded me and inspired me to minister to others, teaching people about Christ through worship and music ministry. Teaching people through a song is my discipleship."



We all have dreams. We all have things we think we want to do. Sometimes, we find out that the path we've set before us is not the path God had planned. Chris McQuiston grew up being involved in the church, going on mission trips, and having the opportunity to take Bible classes at his high school. Attending a Christian university made sense. KCU gave him the opportunity to play soccer and lead worship in chapel while pursuing a career in nursing.

After a year and a half in the nursing program, Chris wasn't satisfied. He felt like he was supposed to be doing something different. He enjoyed leading worship for chapel and other churches but found that nursing was taking too much time away for him to do that regularly. After an opportunity to lead worship at an event, Chris was talking to an old high school friend and asked his friend's thoughts on him doing Worship Ministry. His friend replied, "Dude, what do you mean? You're already doing it."

Chris changed his major and started down a new path, the path God was calling him to. Chris has been the Worship Minister at Belmont Christian Church in Christiansburg, VA for about two

and a half years now. When he's not planning for services, he's out meeting with people, having coffee together, and pouring into them through conversation. On stage, he is guided by Colossians 3:16. "Let the message of Christ dwell among you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom through psalms, hymns, and songs from the Spirit, singing to God with gratitude in your hearts." Chris tells his team that they are teaching the congregation through a song. They are using music to bring about discipleship.

Chris doesn't confine his music to Sunday mornings. For the last three years, he's been writing and putting out original music. He started out by writing a song during his internship at Northeast Christian Church, Louisville, KY. Writing and making music is important to him because of the impact on people not reached on a Sunday; you never know who needs to hear the songs throughout the week.

Working with *Generosity Rocks*, an independent artist fundraising platform, Chris has been able to represent himself on his own record label – McQ Records. Through this platform, Chris has been encouraged to give 10% of his profits back to other artists

or missions. He has been able to support another band and various camps. Chris continues to work on new music and anticipates a new release by early April. His music can be found on Spotify, Apple Music, and YouTube.

Being a student at KCU provided a strong foundation to help him build relationships, learn what it means to have a good ministry and what to look for in leaders. Through soccer, he learned teamwork and how to worship God on the field. An injury during his time at KCU helped Chris learn God's timing and how to overcome adversity. One of the biggest takeaways for Chris are the lifelong relationships he formed during his time on campus. The connections he made at KCU continue to produce after graduation.

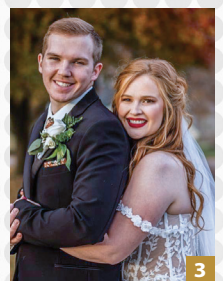
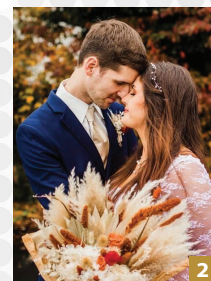

most recently, Corey Fipps. During his 25-year coaching career, he has coached high school football in Central and Eastern Kentucky as well as girls softball and has been involved with KCU athletics for five years by assisting in football and softball recruiting.



He believes that creating and fostering a Christ-centered environment can have a far-

reaching and long-lasting impact on many lives. Personally, Manning believes it is his mission to provide a strong witness for Christ and be an example for those whom God puts in his path. 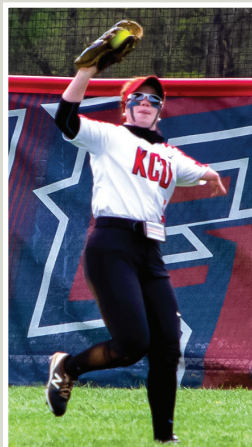
OVERCOMING FOR THE GREATER GOOD

"As you can tell I am a little bit different than everyone else. I have red hair." Those words were spoken by Katelyn Pavey last semester during a testimony she shared in chapel. During the message, Katelyn spoke about the adversities she has overcome during her life.

Katelyn was born limb different with phocomelia. This means that in utero, Katelyn's arm didn't fully develop. She was born with a hand and two digits. A fact that has not held her back in the slightest. Hard work and a determination to succeed led her to develop skills that would allow her to become a very talented softball player here at KCU.



During the chapel service, Katelyn described the events surrounding her mother's pregnancy. A pregnancy that had friends of her mother offering to pay for an abortion. However, Katelyn's mom had been baptized and would not consider this as an option; even when she was placed on bed rest midway through her pregnancy. Through all the testing that her mother underwent,

and ultrasounds that she received, it was never detected that Katelyn had phocomelia.

At birth, the doctors told Katelyn's parents that she would never have a normal life. Yet, Katelyn's parents understood that God created no mistakes. They would tell her that God made her this way for a reason.

Katelyn played several sports as a child, basketball, volleyball, and soccer. Yet, her love was found in the game of softball. She used the adversity that she faced and found joy

in overcoming it. She found ways to adapt. One such way

is a glove transition that she has developed where she puts her glove in her right hand, tucks it and throws. This allows her to get the ball into the field faster. She turned "Can't" into "Continue Adapting, Never Turning Back".

At ten years old she made the goal to play college softball. Later, while attending a Prospect Camp, Katelyn caught the eye of softball coach, Corey Gardner. During her freshman year, while at an Elite Camp, she tore her ACL. She was ineligible to play for her freshman year and worked hard to rehabilitate from that injury. Other bumps in the road led her to KCU, where she followed Coach Gardner.

Since being at KCU, Katelyn has continued to impress not only Coach Gardner, but everyone alike. As a leading batter during her sophomore year, she only struck out five times in 96 at bats. During the last season, Katelyn was named to the NCCAA 2nd All American Team, NCCAA All-Midwest 1st Team and the NFCA Region 1 2nd Team. Now, a KCU alum, Katelyn is working on her master's degree and playing her last two years of eligibility.



"I have been blessed in multiple ways to have this young lady in my life and as part of our softball program. She is an inspiration to everyone around her. I have never heard anyone say a negative comment about her. She is a good student in the classroom, her professors love her because she interacts with them. She is all about giving back to the campus community or the youth through religion and softball. BASS FISHING TEAM WINS BASSMASTERS TOURNAMENT

- Not only did KCU walk away with the win, but broke two college records for weigh-ins.
- KCU now holds the total highest weight in college bass fishing tournaments and the one day total weigh-in record.
- Matt and Lefe Messer have the record for the one day total weigh-in at 36 lbs. 7oz. and won the tournament with a total weigh-in of 61 lbs. 13oz. for a two day record.

A focused plan with patient presentations yielded monumental results for brothers Lefe and Matt Messer of the KCU Bass Fishing Team, who won the Strike King Bassmaster College Series at Harris Chain of Lakes presented by Bass Pro Shops with a two-day total of 61 pounds and 13 ounces (Tournament Record). The Messers caught 25-6 on day 1 and then electrified the final weigh-in with a massive limit of 36-7 (single day record weight). The KCU team earned \$3,070 and a berth in the Bassmaster College Series National Championship (dates and location TBA).

"We went into today not knowing how doable it was to catch another big bag, but we wanted to make them beat us," Lefe Messer said. "By about midday, we started thinking this will be a tough bag to beat. On stage, that winning moment — I can't even describe the emotions."

KCU Head Coach Gene Nornhold commented, "I saw our team pull together to get it done. These two brothers came

together to pull out a lifelong memory." He went on to say, "With growth comes victory. I don't even know where to start other than to acknowledge that God is so good and He will reward those who work for His glory."

"I told (Lefe) all week, 'If it was God's plan we were going to win,'" Matt Messer said. "It ended up working out right."

Trouble averted: Matt Messer described a hotel parking lot mistake after Day 1, which left their boat unplugged all night. Scrambling to overcome the potential disaster of starting the day with a severe power shortage, they were able to find an option at the last moment. "This morning, we put in, pulled as close as we could to a power outlet, and charged the boat while we were waiting for takeoff," Matt Messer said.
