

We were pleased to host the Bible Bowl Winter National Championships in December and we will host them again this December. You would be encouraged if you were to attend a Bible Bowl competition.

God has blessed several of our schools with national recognitions, reaffirmed programmatic accreditation, and exceptional students. We were blessed with an exceptional faculty and staff that worked hard to serve the students during a very challenging season. The COVID-19 rates in both the county and the campus were high at the start of the fall term, but steadily decreased as the school year progressed into spring.

We continue to be blessed by the support from the local churches. Each Sunday that I speak, I encourage the church to begin praying that God would raise up leaders from within their congregation who would come to KCU to train for a life of service. 

KCU BASS FISHING FINISHES IN TOP-25

The Bass Pro Shops School of the Year is college fishing's only allencompassing National Rankings system. Awarding points across various major national collegiate trails, as well as local and regional events, the Association of Collegiate Anglers' National Rankings system is a year-long chase involving school teams from coast to coast. They compete to finish the year ranked not only number

one, but to also be recognized as one of the Top 25 schools in the nation.



Entering the 2021-2022 season, the ACA conducted a Pre-Season Poll to rank the Top 25 school teams in the nation. Media members, coaches, anglers, and industry representatives voted to rank the schools according to who they thought had the best chance to do well this season.

Twenty of the Top 25 ranked school

teams entering the year finished the 2021-22 season inside of the Top 25 for the Bass Pro Shops School of the Year.

YANCEY SCHOOL OF NURSING AGAIN NAMED BEST PROGRAM

Kentucky Christian University Yancey School of Nursing's Online RN to BSN Program has again been named as the best program of its kind in Kentucky by RegisteredNursing.org. KCU's program was rated number one in Kentucky in 2021 as well.

Factors in the dual-year rankings include program affordability, the ratio of tenured instructional faculty, acceptance rates and more. Online programs are growing in importance with demand for advanced education for registered nurses (RNs) in Kentucky on the rise.

Yancey School of Nursing Dean and Chief Nurse Administrator, Dr. Carol Brickey comments, "Our RN to BSN Program is designed for working nurses with busy lives who are looking to go further in their careers. We understand that candidates seek flexibility, affordability, quality and rigor. Our program delivers them all while also fostering individualized educational experiences for students."

The KCU Online RN to BSN Program enables students to earn their BSN degree in four semesters with the ability to take and pay for one course at a time. The program also allows students flexibility to complete their clinical requirements in their home communities, no matter where they live.



READING IN THE ANCIENT WAY: KCU Receives Torah Manuscript Donation

In April 2022, the University received a truly unique donation—a complete nineteenth-century Torah manuscript. Made in the Diaspora tradition, the scroll was penned by an anonymous Polish scribe. It is comprised of 35 calfskin panels that measure nearly 70 feet in length, sewn together using thread from the leg sinew of a kosher animal. The penmanship of the Hebrew text is exquisite, with only careful remarking noted throughout. This manuscript survived by way of irony: it was deemed *pasul*—no longer usable for public reading—and relegated to a storage room, thus escaping the destruction of many Hebrew scriptures that accompanied the Holocaust. Dr. O'Lynn (Graduate Bible) and Dr. Dyson (History) sat down to talk about the value of this donation.

RO: Gerald, what is the value of this donation to the University?

GD: This is an enormously valuable resource for both faculty and students. We can learn much from the Jewish perspective on and love for the scriptures and this manuscript is a window into a piece of that ancient and vital tradition. There is tremendous potential—from introducing students to the way the Old Testament was handed down to better understanding modern Jewish history to learning how to handle documents of historical importance.

GD: What is the value for Biblical studies?

RO: The most important value is the preservation of the text. We can compare the current edition of *Biblia Hebraica* and see significant similarities in how the text has been maintained. This can be of great value in language study as we can have confidence in


knowing that the text before us is solid while also engaging with the ever-fluid nature of language, grammar and syntax. Finally, there is the congregational aspect—reading this text as it would have been read in the traditional way, rolled open with marker in hand (cf., Luke 4:17)!

RO: And what about historical studies?

GD: I believe students often learn best when they learn by doing. Getting one's hands dirty (but no dirty hands on this scroll, please) by working with the material culture and texts of the past, perhaps especially sacred texts, is one of the best ways to immerse oneself in the thought world of the past. When we can understand and contextualize objects like this in their place, time, and culture, we bring ourselves closer to an accurate and responsible view of history.

RO: Finally, what is our responsibility in preserving this manuscript?

GD: Polish Jews suffered terribly during the Second World War and account for nearly half of all victims of the Holocaust. It seems that this Torah was brought to Israel by Holocaust survivors who initially returned to their synagogue after the war but chose not to remain in Poland. It eventually passed into the hands of private collectors from which it came to us. Our responsibility is preserving these sacred texts, using them responsibly, and remembering how such an object came to us so that no such thing will ever happen again.

DR. JOHN DUNDON Receives Lusby Award

Dr. John Dundon was honored at the beginning of our graduation service this spring. The State of Kentucky awarded him the distinction of being a Kentucky Colonel. Mayor George Steele awarded him the key to the city of Grayson and proclaimed the day to be John Dundon Day in Grayson. Kevin Pickett, the chairman of the Board of Trustees presented him with the Lusby Award.

Dr. John Dundon served the University during two separate periods of time. He was Vice President and Executive Vice President from 1991 to 2008. He and his wife Cynde were also heavily involved in First Church of Christ, Grayson where he served as an elder.

John returned to KCU to serve as CFO and our accreditation liaison in 2015 and completed that role this spring.

John's humble spirit and godly disposition has had an influence beyond KCU. The Lusby Award, in part, reads, "the Board of Trustees expresses their gratitude for the diligent efforts, personal dedication, and humble service that have characterized his service."

President Allcorn said, "I have known John as a student, as an elder at my in-law's church, and seen his work first hand at KCU. It has been my privilege to work with him and to know him as a friend."

DIANE MANSFIELD ASSUMES ROLE AS DIRECTOR OF DEVELOPMENT

KCU is pleased to announce that Diane Mansfield has transitioned from her role as a trustee of the University to the Interim Director of Development.



ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT Sammy Harris: Leading the Broken to Life

Not everyone who attends college fits the mold for what a typical college student looks like. This was certainly true for Sammy Harris ('85 & '87). Coming from a poor, farming community, Sammy started at Kentucky Christian University in the fall of 1981. During his second year, Sammy faced many challenges, became discouraged, and was even told he would be better off leaving and going to a vocational school. After a disagreement with his girlfriend, Sammy decided to throw in the towel. He threw his belongings out of his dormitory window, packed up, and went home in the middle of the semester.

He had already been home for a week when an employee of the University showed up at his house to talk. As they visited, this employee told Sammy, "God isn't done with you yet." He had already spoken to professors on Sammy's behalf so he could return to school with no penalty. Encouraged to give it another shot, Sammy went back.

Sammy began a weekend ministry while he was still in school. After finishing his degree, Sammy went on to be a youth minister for 5 ½ years before deciding he wanted to preach. He continued to serve in ministry while also becoming a camp board director, getting involved with a pregnancy health center, and several other roles.

After 17 years in ministry, Sammy needed to step back and took a secular job. A year and a half later, Leesburg Christian Church called. Running at 23 people in attendance, they were looking into selling their building but needed help during the transition. Sammy was invited to preach until they could get the building sold or decided what they needed to do. That was 20 years ago! Leesburg recognized they were a broken church and made it their ministry to reach broken people.

Today, Leesburg has an attendance of about 600 people, have built a new worship center, employs a staff of nine people, hold three worship services every Sunday, and support many local mission efforts. Sammy continues to serve as the lead pastor. They recognize that it's not the healthy who need a doctor, but the sick. A focus is made toward people who are struggling by ministering to them through community service projects, support

groups, feeding the community, caring for wards of the State, and other ministry outreach efforts. Many of their outreach efforts are organized out of "The Hub," an old church building in Cynthiana purchased for their ministry. Everyone gets plugged in to serve somewhere. Everyone is needed.

Leesburg is a church that extends grace and love to people, but they do so without compromising the truth found in Scripture. Sammy has come to realize the value of the education he received at KCU. KCU provided an incredible network of his closest friends to this day. Furthermore, it provided the foundation for him to be able to lead with a different worldview – God's view – as various cultural issues arise. Leesburg wants to make followers of Christ, and that can only be done while holding fast to the truth.

"KCU had people who didn't give up on me and who helped me mature." That mindset fuels the mission of Sammy and the Leesburg congregation to reach the broken people who just need someone to not give up on them.





Daniel White: On a Mission

If you are on the KCU campus, you will see the touch of Daniel White no matter where you are. As the Vice President of Business Operations, he oversees the day-to-day functions of the University. From groundskeeping and housekeeping to finances and budgets, and many things in between, he is leaving his mark by helping to provide the students and employees of KCU a well-cared for campus that we can be proud of.

It's not just here at KCU that Daniel White is leaving his mark. He has been making an impact since he was a high school freshman when he was part of a missionary trip to Venezuela. Since then, he has been to the Dominican Republic, has more recently taken part in two missionary endeavors abroad, and several locally.



As an avid cyclist, Daniel spent early February riding 207 miles from Phoenix, AZ across the Mexican border to the 1MISSION base camp in Puerto Peñasco. The fundraiser "Bikes Fight Poverty" had over 100 participants that worked together to raise \$214,774 for community development.

1MISSION works to empower families by first providing them training and life



skills. These include gardening, construction, weaving, and sewing. These skills will enable families to generate income and become more independent. The organization also works to equip families with housing that missionary teams help to build. In early April, Daniel traveled with members of First Church of Christ,



Grayson to assist in the building of these houses. KCU was well represented on this mission trip, as current KCU student

Micah Adams, and alumni Lexi Gilliland ('19), Mandy Langstaff ('19), and Brooke Holley ('07) were also in attendance.

On a local front, First Church of Grayson has been working across Carter County to provide local missionary work as part of "Empower Carter County". Youth from First Church were on KCU's campus during mid-June working to help better the lives of people within the Carter County community. They worked in many capacities such as building or repairing sheds and handicap ramps. They hosted a car wash that was used to raise money for backpacks for children who are in foster care. They also sold flowers with proceeds given to the family of Timmy Herron who lost his life in a fire earlier this year. The youth also built twenty-five beds for children in Carter County who needed them.

Daniel White is on a mission, and his mission is clear, to meet the needs of people. "There is great value in helping people, and meeting needs. It helps to build strong character in the men and women who take part, and this value can be realized locally to help the church grow closer and build a strong work ethic."
