FOCUS ON MINISTRY ON & OFF CAMPUS

Developing leaders for the church continues to be a passion of mine. I am convinced that leaders are developed through service to others. I'm so pleased that this edition of the Voice is highlighting the amazing work of our students, on and off campus. Let me give you a few examples just to illustrate what I'm talking about. We had more students at the International Conference on Missions than any other school according to ICOM personnel. Locally, we had more students and staff at a food packing event held in Grayson than anyone else, including the sponsoring organization. We have had student groups help with missions located in Grayson such as Hippo Valley and the International Christian Braille Mission. We have sent students to Mountain Mission School, local K-12 schools, and countless other locations.

We are also very pleased to welcome Dr. Rob Shoaff as the Dean of the Keeran School of Bible and Ministry. He has already made an impact on campus and has led his school in the beginning stages of reconnecting with the Association for Biblical Higher Education (ABHE).

There is a compelling spirit on campus that constantly reminds me of both the joy and the responsibility of serving at KCU as each of us strives to create an environment of discipleship. As we highlight our students in service on and off of campus, it might be helpful to hear one student's story. His journey from disillusioned athlete at another school to ministry major at KCU.

Frustrated with where he was in life, he prayed that God would lead him to a university where he could both enjoy his sport of football and feel appreciated as a member of a community. Shortly after he finished praying, KCU head coach Jake Russell's text appeared on his phone inviting him to consider studying at KCU and playing football.


He started at KCU this past fall. At the end of the semester, senior ministry major Isaiah Jones preached a powerful sermon in chapel. He felt strongly that there were those who needed to be immersed into Christ. He said that he was going to be in the chapel that evening and anyone who wanted to be baptized could come. After baptizing a member of the softball team, they were about to leave when Josh showed up to be baptized. He was not only immersed into Christ, but subsequently changed his major to ministry!



But it has not always been easy. Josh had a school bill to pay off in order to return in the spring. His

family held a side-of-the-road BBQ in Texas and raised the money that he needed to be able to return. He has both given his testimony in chapel and shared his story with me personally. We are honored to have Josh as a Knight.

We will continue to cultivate an environment where students will be recruited and called to service no matter what their chosen profession, and where God will call some of them to a life of full-time ministry. We praise God for the students He has sent us and pray that He will continue to send us more students like Josh, students who are open to the Spirit's leading and are called to a life of service.



MORE THAN MEETS THE EYE

Taking a Closer Look at KCU's Young Library

A key building on any university campus is the library. Students spend long hours there, studying and preparing projects. Faculty and staff compile research for presentations or books they are writing. The library is vital to campus life. This is certainly true about the library on KCU's campus; however, most people don't realize that there is more to what happens there than is noticed with a casual glance. Named for Dr. L. Palmer Young, the third president of KCU, the library houses thousands of books, magazines and other resources in both print and electronic formats. These materials are available to more than just the immediate KCU family. People from the community are welcome to apply for a KCU library card.

Family Friendly

Families can come and check out picture books for preschoolers, history books for high school research projects and cookbooks for Mom (or Dad!). "It is always exciting for us when area high school teachers recommend our resources to their students to complete research projects," says Naulayne Enders, director of the library. Area ministers are also eligible to sign up for a card and checkout materials for personal use.

Open to Alumni

Alumni of the university can get their own library cards. While library cards are not necessary to use materials within the library, Alumni can use a card to checkout items and request copies of pages for their personal reading and research. Enders stated, "We know that we have some unique items in our collection that alumni come back to locate. We like to keep these resources as accessible as possible to them."

The Hoven Room

In the library is a special area called the Hoven Room. Dr. Ard Hoven was a professor at KCU for many years, and he had an expansive personal library. Many of his books chronicle the history of the Restoration Movement or explore tenets of the Christian faith. His personal library has formed the core of this collection and guides additions to this important special collection. These books cannot be removed from the building, people can come in and use the materials.

Church Legacy Project

The staff of the Young Library is also committed to preserving the histories of local congregations. Several years ago, The Church Legacy Project was launched as part of the Restoration History and Archives Collection. At no cost to the church, the library will preserve any records that document the history of



the church, such as ministers who have served, names of charter members, building programs, missionaries the church has supported, etc. This project helps preserve the records of churches while at the same time provides documents for future researchers.

Book Donations Welcomed

Books are frequently gifted to the KCU library. All donations are recorded in a donor database and then evaluated for use. Books in good condition that are not on the shelves are added to the collection. Duplicates are offered for sale within the library for a very low price. This allows KCU students to beginning building their personal libraries before they graduate.

For example, the library sometimes has commentary sets that they cannot use. These extra books are available for ministry students to purchase to help build their personal libraries. Similarly, duplicate copies of children's books are set out for students in the Keeran School of Education to purchase. Most school systems do not provide the funds for new teachers to buy books for a classroom library. Future teachers can start building their book collections before they graduate.

Dr. Robert E. Shoaff Appointed Keeran School of Bible & Ministry Dean

by Dr. Keith P. Keeran, Chancellor, Kentucky Christian University Following a lengthy search, Dr. Terry Allcorn has announced the appointment of Robert E. Shoaff, Ph.D., as the new Dean of the Keeran School of Bible and Ministry (KSBM).

Dr. Shoaff brings strong academic credentials and significant professional experience to the Dean's position. He holds bachelor's and master's degrees in Biblical Studies, Ministry, and Christian Leadership from Kentucky Christian University, and a Doctor of Philosophy degree in Cross-Cultural Leadership from Johnson University. In addition to academic preparation, he also brings a breadth of classroom, ministry and mission experience.

Dr. Shoaff served most recently at Lincoln Christian University as professor of Cultural Intelligence, Cultural Contextualization, and Cross-Cultural Ministry. His cross-cultural teaching experience includes five years at Sonlight Bible College in Port-de-Paix, Haiti, and two years teaching Comparative World Religions at La Universidad de Murcia, Spain. In Spain, he served five years with the Bill Loft Mission, as a church planter in both Spain and North Africa. Dr. Shoaff also has a record of effective service in the U.S. as the lead minister of Christian Churches and Churches of Christ in Hillsboro, Ohio and Albion, Illinois, and as the Executive Director of Little Galilee Christian Camp & Retreat Center in Clinton, Illinois.

Dr. Shoaff is excited to join the educational ministry of his alma mater and lead the Keeran School of Bible and Ministry in fulfillment of its mission "to enlist, educate and equip missional leaders empowered by biblical authority and worldview to advance the purposes of God for the benefit of his church and its mobilization of disciples in response to the Great Commission."

"I am passionate about the renewed vision that I believe the Lord has given to the KSBM," Dr. Shoaff said. "As I seek the Lord's guidance, listening for the Spirit's voice and watching for His movement, and as I partner with colleagues, I desire to make Jesus' name great in all things. May He be praised now and forevermore."

The challenge facing the Committee was to remember that the advanced degrees, awards, and accomplishments listed in a curriculum vita or resumé pale in significance compared to the content of a candidate's heart. In the matter of selecting a Dean for the Keeran School of Bible and Ministry, the Committee was looking for someone with a heart for the things that matter to God. The committee was in prayer for a missional leader – a man of God's own choosing – a man that would show us his heart.

The Search Committee, led by the careful and professional leadership of Calvin Lindell, Vice President of Academic Affairs and Chair of the Search Committee was looking for evidence of faithfulness to the inspired Word of God and a love for preaching and teaching the Bible clearly and accurately; a proven heart for local church ministry and evangelism, including disciple-making and church planting in intercultural contexts; a strong commitment to educating ministers with a deep commitment to Scripture, personal purity, service, and missional leadership in the church, both in the U.S. and throughout the world, and by every possible means of educational access; a visionary leader that can inspire excellence in scholarship, instructional skill in the classroom, and mentoring throughout a student's educational journey and beyond; an active recruiter that is excited about collaborating with other deans, staff, faculty and coaches to identify capable students already on campus that may, with encouragement, direct their gifts toward ministry; a voice of advocacy in support of Christ's prayer for the unity of believers (John 17:20-26).

Dr. Shoaff provided confirming evidence for each of the key leadership areas included in the President's charge to the Committee. Dr. Keith P. Keeran, Chancellor of the University and Interim Dean of the School of Bible and Ministry said, "The Search Committee committed itself to finding a Dean that is a strong advocate for the hermenutics that shaped the Restoration Movement; a Dean that will not neglect the historical value of the reformers' struggle as a required component of the curricular experience in ministerial education. We believe we have found such an advocate in Dr. Robert E. Shoaff."



Under President Allcorn's leadership, the University had its institutional accreditation reaffirmed yet again by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges. Under Dr. Shoaff's leadership as Dean, the Keeran School of Bible and Ministry will seek accreditation of its programs with the Association for Biblical Higher Education. The motivation for this is to access educational and training resources that are program specific, and will benefit the assessment of continuous improvement in both instructional methods, student performance, and accountability to the Christian mission and vision of the KSBM.

Program accreditation will also provide a platform for faculty to engage with others in educational leadership and to benefit from best practices in both in-person and online education. As well as seeking program accreditation, Dr. Shoaff will be a visionary leader in the department and teach various courses throughout the Keeran School of Bible and Ministry.



FROM THE HEART...

Voice: What is your vision for the Keeran School of Bible and Ministry?

Dr. Shoaff: I believe there are a lot of expectations for the KSBM as the flagship program at KCU. I don't believe that the KSBM is more important than any of the other academic programs here at KCU – and all are led by some incredible Christian men and women – but I believe that the KSBM is the department that should be out in front, leading the way. The vision is that we would lead the way when it comes to spiritual development on campus and in our community. We should lead the way when it comes to influence in the lives of every student on campus. We should lead the way in preparing Great Commissioners to spread the Gospel of the Kingdom of God. My vision for the Keeran School of Bible and Ministry is to be the premier school in the Restoration Movement for preparing transformative Christian Leaders who academically understand the depths of Scripture and are able to apply Jesus' ethic in practical ministry wherever God may lead them.

Voice: What do you want graduates from the KSBM to take away from the program?

Dr. Shoaff: We have a few short years to teach, influence, and disciple our students at KCU. While they are here, we want to strengthen them in Christian character through modeling Christian character to them. We want to encourage them to pursue the dreams that God has placed in their hearts to be world-changers...passionately serving in God's Kingdom, doing the work they have been called to do. While they are here, we want them to be transformed from students to thinkers, and from thinkers to dreamers. When students graduate, we want them to be transformed from being dreamers to pursuers... pursuers of God's Kingdom initiatives all over the world, as ambassadors of bringing the Kingdom of heaven here to earth through the power and provision of the Holy Spirit. As they live and work, we want them to look back on their

time at KCU, knowing that it was here that they gained the skills and honed their passion to have a daily engagement in ministry.

Voice: What message would you like to give to KCU alumni?

Dr. Shoaff: First of all, as a KCU alum myself ('96 & '09)...I appeal to my fellow alumni for partnership in the ministry of KCU. I know that, for various reasons, our alumni are our strongest and most faithful allies and also our greatest critics. I am one amongst you. I would appeal to you to trust KCU with your young men and women to be trained, taught, and loved in a similar way that you were while you were here. My sincerest prayer is that this generation of students will have an even better experience than we did – that they would be better trained and better prepared than we were (and we had great men and women leading us!). As we seek to become the premier school for Bible and Ministry, and as we continue to faithfully teach the Bible in our classrooms and live it out on campus, and we seek to narrow the gap between academia and practical ministry, that you will see that KCU is worthy of your investments. My desire is for campus to be a safe place of growth in Christ, spiritually, academically, and vocationally, and that our students tangibly connect to real-world, real-issue ministries while they are here...not just after they graduate. Secondly, I would like to say to our alumni that I have dedicated myself to working towards increased enrollment, revamping major and minor emphasis of study, offering excellent graduate and undergraduate programs, and seeking program accreditation through ABHE. I would ask that you join me in these efforts. Please pray for me, our faculty and administration, and our students. Pray how you may be able to be involved in shaping the future of KCU. As great is our history, I believe that our best days are ahead of us.



Being a college student is stressful. Many students are hours away from home and their support systems. For the first time, they are on their own, and they are trying to balance academics, athletics, work, and many other aspects of college life. For many, this becomes overwhelming and their mental wellbeing begins to suffer.


Mental and physical health are so closely tied together. When someone is faced with stress, their body has a physical response and can cause problems with blood pressure or can manifest in terms of physical symptoms such as headaches and stomach problems. This impacts a student's ability to be in the classroom, or their ability to focus.

Understanding how these issues can affect a student inside the classroom is critical to their success. KCU is blessed with two women who work endlessly to ensure that student mental and physical needs are not only addressed, but are met. They are beacons of hope and light for so many of the students at KCU.

Tonia Tussey is the campus nurse, and a vital resource to our

students. Since being hired, she has helped to revamp the Student Health Service area. She has changed the location of the clinic, and helped to bring a nurse practitioner to campus for students who have chronic illnesses.

April Frazier, a KCU alumna,



began working as the counselor in January 2022. Her office is a sanctuary for students and staff due to the changes she has also worked to instill. Her office is the epitome of tranquility.

Tonia and April have worked to create an area that is a safe space for students. "In our Student Health Service area, students have the benefit of a Christian nurse and counselor who understand the relationship of mental, physical, and spiritual health. In understanding this relationship, we can address the student as a whole. It is not uncommon for a student to be treated not only with medications or interventions but with prayer, a cup of coffee and a quiet corner. Our goal in Student Health Services is to provide a safe area where not only can students get treatment or counseling but can rest and decompress."

In addition to their individual service, they both oversee "Mama's Closet" which is a pantry that students can access for basic necessities and toiletries, free of



charge. If there are particular items that a student may need, and it is not in the pantry, April and Tonia will work to get it for the student.

To be as dedicated and compassionate as these two are, their motivation is simple. It is the desire and call to be the "Hands and Feet of Christ". In the foyer of their offices hangs a sign that reads "We are inspired by the love of Christ to provide quality health care in ways which respect the God given dignity of each person and the sacredness of life."

KCU Reach exists to develop partnerships between KCU students and local churches and camps and are equipped to serve with and come alongside established ministries. The program offers several ways for us to connect, such as summer camp teams, youth retreats, youth lock-ins, Sunday morning volunteers, and more! Starting in the Fall of 2023, we will be adding a worship component known as the "Kingdom Collective," under the direction of our Worship Collective Director, Emily Wolfe. Kingdom Collective is a selected team of students within the Worship Collective who partner with KCU Reach teams. They travel to different area churches within the region to help serve through worship leadership.

Since launching in the Spring of 2022, the Reach program has had the privilege of partnering with 12 Christian Camps and over 20 local churches spanning across the state of Kentucky and southern Indiana. In addition to traveling to these camps and churches, the Reach program hosts on-campus events such as our annual Tri-State Worship Night. All of this, of course, would not be possible if it was not for the 40+ student volunteers who desire to serve.



ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT MATTHEW BARKER

Among many KCU alumni circling the globe, Matthew Barker is working tirelessly to make a difference in the lives of his



students. The 2016 graduate along with his wife, Sydney, have been teaching in Dakar, Senegal since 2019. "This was not part of my five year plan.

When I graduated from KCU with a teaching degree, I never thought God would take me to West Africa," says Barker.

While working at Dakar Academy, both Matthew and Sydney have been asked to step out of their comfort zones and teach new classes serving multiple age groups. "Being able to learn subjects alongside our students has reminded us that there is still a lot to learn." Dakar Academy serves students from 60 different countries including many missionary families. With around 300 students spread across 3 campuses there are always activities going on.

Outside of the classroom, the Barkers try to find ways to provide fun and education for their middle school students. "We're engaged and leading several clubs and provide opportunities for our students to play sports and engage their minds." One of the clubs Matthew is excited about is the school's robotics club. He is repurposing his old laptop to allow students to learn and share in one of his favorite hobbies.

Relocating from Illinois to Senegal has been an adjustment for both Matthew and his wife. "I would say being aware of the language and cultural barriers has been a learning experience for us. There are phrases or idioms that we may use in the states that have no meaning here." The Barkers had never lived outside of the United States previously. Moving over 5000



miles away from the familiarity of home has been a very daunting adjustment. "It is difficult being away from family and friends, but Dakar has become our home." They are able to video chat with family in the US but have found comfort while in West Africa.

Senegal is a predominantly Muslim country. There are many mosques, and people adhere to Muslim practices like answering the call to prayer multiple times a day. Everyone will stop in the streets and put their lives on pause to spend a few moments in prayer. While the primary language in Dakar is Wolof, many in the business world speak French. "Something we have really appreciated is the hospitality that the locals have shown us."

The Wolof word for hospitality is Teranga, which is a big principle in their culture. An example of this is how the Senegalese share meals. Six to eight people will all eat out of the same large bowl. As you eat your section, the eldest of the group will distribute the meat at the center (usually chicken) to those who are eating around him. It is not uncommon to offer a spot at a bowl to someone walking down the street. "This has been offered to me a few times by those in my neighborhood as I am walking down the street," Barker describes.

As they finish their fourth year, they have prayerfully decided to sign on for another four year contract to stay in Senegal. "We feel God has been moving and is teaching us so much as we do our best to remain faithful to Him." Not only are they excited about sharing Jesus with their students, they pray for opportunities with their Muslim neighbors as well. Both Matthew and Sydney have been learning Wolof in hopes of connecting and sharing the Gospel with those around them in their native language. They see the opportunities that God has placed before them as they minister to this unique group of people.
